Winners all around at Albany Wine & Dine festival

Chefs, mixologists show their best creations at benefit for arts groups

The 10th-anniversary Wine & Dine for the Arts festival, held last weekend in Albany, was projected to be one of the largest ever in terms of attendance as a result of a move last year from its longtime home, the Hilton Albany, to the Empire State Plaza, and the gala dinner this year moving from the plaza to Albany Capital Center.

Nearly 600 tickets were sold for Saturday night's gala, up about 20 percent because of the larger room. Overall, the festival attracted about 2,800 people, organizers said.

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Below are the winners for various competitions held over the weekend.

Signature Chefs Invitational: Fabrizio Facchini, Taverna Novo, Saratoga Springs. Facchini's win earns him a place as one of the chefs cooking for the gala for 2020. Invitational chefs were given a mystery basket with trout, rabbit, chickpeas and eggplant. Facchini made an appetizer of smoked trout with pappardelle and

chickpeas; his entree was fried rabbit with orange, pomegranate molasses and mint, with eggplant seasoned with thyme and olive oil.

Bloody mary competition:

People's choice: Logan Hoffis, Nicole's Restaurant, Albany. The Bloody Italian, with roasted tomato, plum tomato, fresh basil, cherry pepper, lemon and pesto, garnished with tomato, mozzarella and basil crystals. Will be added to Nicole's cocktail menu in a week or so.

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Judges' choice: Ysrael "Izzy" Quezada, Ama Cocina, Albany. Maria Envidiosa (Envious Mary), a green bloody mary with salsa verde, green grape juice, kiwi juice, mango, pickled serrano and cucumber vodka, rimmed with celery salt and green peppercorn. Available for Saturday brunch starting this weekend.

Manhattan competition:

People's choice: Logan Hoffis, Nicole's Restaurant. Roasted Fighattan, with bourbon, Carpano Antica, Montenegro Amaro, reduction of sherry and roasted fig, black-walnut bitters; and Bourbon Americano, with

bourbon, espresso, hazelnut liqueur and Averna Amaro. Will be added to Nicole's cocktail menu in a week or so.

Judges' choice: Olivia Savas, 677 Prime, Albany. Manhattan Experience, with bourbon, sweet vermouth, aquavit, banana liqueur, mole bitters and cacao nibs; and Tai'd Up in Delhi, with bourbon, pineapple liqueur, orange curacao, orgeat syrup, lime juice and cardamom bitters. Will be available at 677 Prime starting this week.

Slider Slam:

People's choice: Zach Simard and Elliott Vogel, Daley's on Yates, Schenectady. French onion-braised short rib, cheddar sauce, crisp parsnip and sorrel, brioche bun. Available as an appetizer at Daley's on Yates starting this week and at Old Daley on Crooked Lake for 10 weeks of weeks of winter dining starting Thursday, Jan. 24.

Judges' choice: Jaime Ortiz and Ken Kehn, 677 Prime. Tandoori beef, mango chutney, lime pickle, raita, Kashmir chiles, cucumber and cilantro. Likely to be available at 677 Prime on an occasional basis as a daily feature starting as soon as this week.

Final net proceeds from the festival are still being totaled but they were expected to exceed \$110,000, bringing Wine & Dine's 10-year total to more than \$1 million. (The total after the first nine years was \$925,000.) Main beneficiaries of the 2019 festival are the Albany Barn, Capital Repertory Theatre, Palace Theatre and Park Playhouse. Secondary beneficiaries are Albany Center Gallery, Albany Institute of History & Art, Albany Symphony, Black Dimension in Art, Capitaland Chorus, Capital Cinema, eba Dance and Steamer No. 10.
